About the College

St Barnabas College was established in 1880 in a beautiful bluestone building in the heart of picturesque North Adelaide by Bishop Augustus Short, the first Anglican bishop of Adelaide. The college is situated across the road from St Peter's Cathedral, adjacent to stunning parklands and Adelaide Oval. Historically, the college provided theological education primarily for those preparing for ordination in the Anglican Church. The site was closed in 1950 and the college reopened in 1965 at Belair in the Adelaide Hills as a residential college. St Barnabas College continued at Belair until 1997 when it was relocated into the Adelaide College of Divinity complex at Brooklyn Park in the western suburbs. At that stage the college ceased being residential and embraced opportunities for lay learning in the new ecumenical environment.

The college returned to its original and current site in North Adelaide in 2015.

Throughout its long history St Barnabas College has consistently delivered high quality undergraduate and postgraduate theological education, equipping clergy, laity, and ordination candidates for ministry in the church and for Christian life in the world. Although an Anglican college, St Barnabas continues to value and practice the ecumenical spirit gained from the era of partnership with the Adelaide College of Divinity. Teaching and learning experiences take in a diversity of theological perspectives which sit within a principle of 'generous orthodoxy.'

St Barnabas College is a function of the Anglican Diocese of Adelaide, serving the educational needs of the Diocese and the Province of South Australia.

The College is a member college of the University of Divinity and is accredited to deliver awards in Ministry and Theology and associated areas.

Additionally, St Barnabas College engages sessional lecturers to deliver units across diverse fields, including Biblical Studies, Indigenous Studies, Liturgy and Worship, Anglican Studies, Pastoral Care, Mission, Church History, Homiletics, Ancient Languages, Systematic Theology. All lecturers are accredited with the University of Divinity and teach to the highest standards.

St Barnabas College operates as a Community of Learning for the Whole People of God. As such the College offers education programs which are non-accredited with the University and easily accessible for all people. In 2025 The Archbishop's Certificate for Ministry will focus on equipping laity for ministry in parishes. Community learning options include professional development programs for clergy and licensed lay people.

Spiritual Life on Campus

No theological college would be complete without a communal spiritual dimension. The college staff meets Monday, Wednesday & Thursday in the Chapel for Morning Prayer (9.15am), and on Tuesdays in the Dean's Chapel of St Peter's Cathedral. Students are encouraged to attend Morning Prayer when they are able. A weekly

St Barnabas College Site Information

Opening times

The College is open Monday to Friday each week. Academic staff can be contacted either by email, telephone or leaving a message with reception.

The Library is open Monday to Thursday from 9am to 5pm. Library staff are available in these hours to help staff and students with their questions and enquiries.

Security

Internal Security

The internal security gives access to staff offices and the Diocesan Office. Black keypads are on the wall near entry points into these spaces. Please note that sessional lecturers, students and Library users do not have direct access to staff offices for security reasons.

External Security

A key is required to lock and unlock both the glass and wooden doors at the front of the building. The doors are opened at 8.30 am each weekday. Between semesters the main doors to the building are locked at 5pm by administration staff of Synod Office. The cleaners will arm a monitored security system after they finish.

Parking

Parking is not available on site during the day. Metered parking spots are available in the surrounding streets, including a small number of unmetered car park spaces on the northern side of Pennington Terrace near King William Road.

During 'event parking' (associated with major events such as football and cricket matches, concerts, etc. at the Adelaide Oval), metered parking is restricted. Check the Adelaide Oval [What's On](#) events page for disruptions. Wilson's at Adelaide Oval offers discounted parking in the North Car Park on non-event days. First Aid

First aid kits are located in the kitchen and reception. If you or someone else needs first aid for minor injuries during the day, the first aid trained member of staff is Damian Szepessy. Marianne Gillard and Tracey Jolly are fully trained first aid staff of Synod Office – contact via Reception. After hours, there may be no trained first aid persons in attendance, in this instance please call an ambulance for serious matters.

Emergency Evacuation and Critical Incidents

If there is an emergency situation that requires evacuation of the building, you must leave immediately. The designated fire wardens will direct you to the assembly area, which is the Cathedral Lodge carpark on Pennington Terrace, or if that is not safe, in the parkland just across Pennington Terrace from the carpark entrance.

If a situation arises where Police need to be called urgently, alert Reception or another staff member.

Fire warden for St Barnabas is Damian Szepessy.

Please ensure that a critical incident report is provided as soon as possible after the incident has occurred. The report form can be downloaded from the staff page of the SBC website, or a hard copy can be accessed from the College Registrar. Completed forms should be submitted asap.

It is critical that you understand the structure of your award and plan your subject choices to meet the requirements. Those who are seeking ordination have specific subject requirements within the structure. These requirements may vary across Dioceses.

You are strongly advised to meet with the Academic Dean dszepessy@sbc.edu.au to establish a study plan that takes account of your requirements, your interests and availability of subjects. If you are in Discernment or Ministry Formation within the Diocese of Adelaide, you are required to meet regularly with the Formation and Discernment Coordinator, Rev Jude Benton, and occasionally with the Academic Dean about your study program.

Graduate Attributes

The University of Divinity approved five Graduate Attributes in 2012 and these continue to provide strong guidance. The Attributes shape all the University's courses of study with each course and unit of study aligning its Learning Outcomes with the Graduate Attributes. These Attributes establish the University's aspirations for all its graduates.

- **Learn** - Graduates are equipped for critical study, especially of Christian texts and traditions
- **Articulate** - Graduates articulate theological insight and reflection

Opportunities to develop these attributes will be provided throughout your studies at UD in line with our commitment to our students.

Unit Outlines

Unit outlines for each unit are available on ARK for you to access 2 weeks prior to the commencement of each session.

Unit Outlines are important documents because they identify the formal requirements in the subject. It provides the details about the unit, its learning outcomes, assessment items, contact details for staff etc.

Textbooks

Students will need to purchase textbooks from local bookshops or online book sellers. As textbooks listed within the unit outlines have considerable use during the semester, they will need to be purchased. Textbooks can be purchased locally from [Koorong](#). However, they may not be in stock and will need to be ordered in advance. [Booko](#) is a very useful website which provides comparative pricing across a range of online book sellers. Please enquire early to ensure availability.

St Barnabas College Library may hold one or two print copies of unit textbooks if they are not available in eBook format. Texts are placed on Reserve (library use only), or 7-day loan subject to lecturer requests. The library's preference is to purchase electronic copies of textbooks if available. Assignment Submission

Assessment is a crucial quality measure in higher education, a key motivation for student learning, and an important part of curriculum and learning task development. Information on this page is a summary of a selection of University policies relevant to assessment.

All students should consult the full suite of University [Policies and Procedures](#) prior to commencing your course of study. University Policies and forms directly relevant to assessment are linked at the end of the page.

St Barnabas College uses the electronic submission of assignments via ARK. All subjects will use the system (except for Greek or Hebrew). Students are therefore required to submit using ARK. Assignments will be returned to you through ARK.

Your 'Due Date' and time is to be understood as 11:59pm on the day your assignment is due.

UD requires lecturers to mark and return assignments in a timely manner (maximum 3 weeks after the due date), provide adequate feedback, and a grade and a mark.

Extensions and Special Provisions

It is expected that students studying at a tertiary level will be able to manage their time and workload to complete tasks by the assigned due dates. However, there are provisions for extensions when unforeseen circumstances apply. Unforeseen circumstances include (but are not limited to):

- Serious illness or injury
- Pregnancy or childbirth
- Serious illness or bereavement of an immediate family member
- Traumatic experiences
- Serious upheaval or a disaster
- Legal responsibilities, such as jury service
- Military service or emergency services responsibilities
- Unusually restricting employment commitments, such as being sent overseas

These provisions are outlined in the University's [Assessment Policy](#).

Students requiring an extension during the semester, before the assessment due date, should apply for a [Lecturer's Extension](#).

Students requiring an extension beyond the end of the exam period will need to apply for a [Dean's Extension](#).

Grades

You will receive both a grade and a mark on assessments.

Grades are based on weighted assessment tasks which are awarded a whole percentage point from 0 to 100. These are based on grade descriptors to the following bands:

- High Distinction (HD) = 85–100
- Distinction (D) = 75–84
- Credit (C) = 65–74
- Pass (P) = 50–64
- Fail (F) = 0–49

For more information about grade descriptors, refer to the [Assessment Policy](#) (Schedule B).

Students who wish to request a review of the final grade awarded in a subject should consult with their lecturer in the first instance. Grounds for review can be found in UD's Assessment Policy §15.

Grades are confidential and are only disclosed by the lecturer to the student.

The University's Student Information Management System, Paradigm, allows students to check your enrolment information and access your results online. Check the [key dates](#) to see when results will be released.

The screen will display the units in which you are enrolled for this course. The overall grade you have received for the unit is listed under the 'Grades' column.

Late Penalties

Work handed in after assigned due dates will receive a penalty as per the University of Divinity's [Assessment Policy](#). Penalties are applied on the following basis:

- Up to 24 hours late: at lecturer's discretion
- Over 1 day and up to 1 week late: 10%
- Over 1 week and up to 2 weeks late: 20%
- Over 2 weeks and up to 3 weeks late: 30%
- Over 3 week and up to 4 weeks late: 40%

Referencing

Learning how to use and reference the work of others is an important part of learning to study at university level. Knowing how ideas have developed over time, the main contributors, significant texts and electronic resources are major aspects of higher education learning.

Assignments should be written and referenced according to the [UD Style Guide](#).

Endnote is referencing software available free of charge to all SBC students enrolled with the UD. The UD Library provides Endnote referencing software guides and information.

AI Guidelines for assessment

St Barnabas College (SBC) recognises the inclusion of Generative Artificial Intelligence (AI) in tertiary education. We acknowledge that this technology has the potential to aid and improve teaching, learning, and research. The responsible use of AI can help SBC to enable and enhance its mission to train and equip individuals for ministry.

If a student decides to use AI as an aid for their learning, the most relevant tool provided by SBC is Microsoft Copilot. Students who wish to use Microsoft Copilot may do so by contacting SBC's Registrar (registrar@sbc.edu.au) to request access to the College's Microsoft 365. Students have the right to choose not to use AI. If a student decides not to use AI, they will not be penalised.

- For students who require help with proofreading and essay structure, the use of AI for spelling and grammar checks is encouraged. The recommended prompt in Copilot is: "Spelling and grammar check only," followed by pasting the section of text to be checked. Because all essays and assignment activities are to be a student's own work, asking AI to paraphrase or make the writing sound more academic is not encouraged or approved.
- With the knowledge and/or advice of the unit lecturer, students may use AI to structure an essay or assignment activity. The recommended prompt is: "Suggest an outline or structure for [enter essay/assignment activity topic]."
- AI may be used for brainstorming. The recommended prompt is: "Brainstorm ideas for [enter topic]." Though feedback on an assessment activity can be provided by AI, it is highly recommended that feedback on any essay or assignment activity is sought from the unit lecturer before final submission.
- AI can be used to look up resources for further investigation on a topic. The recommended prompts: "Provide a list of high-quality resources including academic articles, books, websites on [insert topic]" or "I'm exploring the topic of [insert topic here]"
- Translate biblical or other languages. Students will need to put into Copilot "translate", then paste a text into Copilot.
- Organising a correct bibliography for Chicago Style Manual 17th Edition.
- The final copy for submission of any assignment is the responsibility of the student. An essay or assignment activity, including comments in footnotes, may not be solely produced by any AI tool and is treated as a breach of academic integrity.
- Acknowledgement of the use of AI is required. Students must articulate their use of AI to the unit lecturer by providing the reasons for its use. A form is provided to students, which must be completed in the relevant sections and submitted to

the unit lecturer with each assignment or assessment activity that is completed by using AI.

Academic Misconduct

Academic misconduct (including plagiarism) is a very significant issue in universities. Ignorance is no defence and the penalties can be very severe. The [UD Code of Conduct](#) and its policies provide definitions, procedures and penalties and you need to be familiar with these to ensure you do not transgress.

The UD Academic Integrity Policy identifies several kinds of academic misconduct, including:

- Plagiarism--using another person's words, ideas or other work without appropriate acknowledgment.
- Cheating—copying, falsifying data, etc.
- Collusion—unauthorised collaboration on assessment
- Misuse of generative artificial intelligence – see academic integrity policy

All scholarly and professional work involves researching, understanding and building on the work of others. These sources must be expressed in particular ways and acknowledged through specific forms of referencing. Academic work which does not do this is known as plagiarism and is contrary to the values of academic integrity and honesty.

Instances of plagiarism by St Barnabas students undermine the reputation of the University of Divinity and St Barnabas College and diminish the value of academic awards for all graduates of the College.

Learning how to use the ideas of others in your assignments is one of the skills you need to develop as you study. This takes time and effort and you are advised to use the resources on referencing and plagiarism provided by UD.

Copyright

In Australia, the works of others is automatically protected by copyright. Under the Fair Dealing provisions of the Copyright Act, you can copy a reasonable portion for the purposes of research or study.

Limits

The Fair Dealing copying limits are generally:

- 1 chapter or up to 10% of the pages in a book containing 10 or more pages.
- 10% of the words in an unpagged work (i.e. eBooks or websites)
- One article in a journal issue, or more if the articles are on the same subject
- 15 pages of a literary or dramatic work in an anthology.

eBooks and Journal articles

The University of Divinity provides access to electronic books and journals for education and research use. Many of these resources are licensed, and access is restricted to University of Divinity staff and students. You can copy, print, or download electronic resources for your private research or study, and they cannot be re-distributed.

Open Access (OA)

Open Access describes is a form of publishing which aims to make research publications such as journal articles and books freely available online.

While there are different models of open access, fully open access research can be accessed, read, downloaded, or shared. To find out more about open access resources visit <https://divinity.libguides.com/open-access>

Appeals and Complaints

All members of the University, including students and academic staff, must abide by the University of Divinity's [Code of Conduct](#). Paradigm

Paradigm EMS (Educational Management System) is the site where you can view your enrolment details and access results. The login details are the same for your logins to Paradigm and Library Hub.

Maintaining your Personal Details

It is the responsibility of all students to maintain their personal details on their student record. These may include contact address (including out of session and mailing addresses), telephone number, family name, etc. You can change your personal details by contacting either the Academic Dean or Academic Registrar.

Student Card

Commencing students can choose to have a student card issued after accepting their offer of admission. Those students who meet the criteria for full-time can also receive a student concession card. Enrolment

FEE-HELP

The Australian Government provides loans to students who meet certain citizenship/residency requirements. FEE-HELP is a loan from the Australian Government to pay all or part of your fees when you study a higher education course at an approved higher education provider. Upfront

Inclusive language
